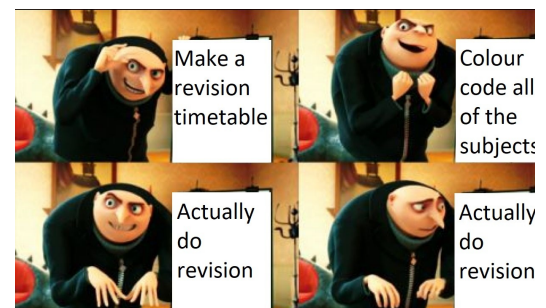


Stasis Essay Revision Check-List

- SAVE EVERYTHING. Save your work right now in the Cloud Drive in which you are drafting. NOW.
- Sources/ Works Cited: You MUST include a Works Cited. This is an MLA formatted listing of 3-5+ sources cited, quoted, and referenced directly within your paper.
- Bibliography: You MUST include a Bibliography, even if it's all the same sources as your WC. A bibliography lists of all sources that were read or review as part of your research and writing process.
- Stasis Theory: All 7 branches of “stasis theory” represented. This means at least 7 essay paragraphs.
- No Argument: The stasis essay is simply creating a rich, cited “report” on different aspects of topic.
- Definition/ Description Paragraph: a description of your topic (“BIR”s help here!)
- Context/History/ Cause & Effect Paragraph: describe the where/when of your topic.
- Action(s) Paragraph: describe any actions, ideologies, or missions your topic advocates or evokes.
- Value Paragraph: describe why this topic matters—this is also “so what?” “exigence”
- Conversations & Controversies Paragraph: describe the conversations your topic evokes.
- Questions Paragraph: outline a few questions for your topic.
- Jurisdiction/ Audience Paragraph: describe who is in the audience, who is talking about this topic.
- Stasis Essay jumps right in with clarity and concision about topic. Absolutely no “society” or “people today” or “since the beginning of time” or fluffy language of any kind.
- Structure: Essay is clearly and effectively organized.
- Development: Essay develops each point fully and thoughtfully.
- Style/ Voice/ Transitions: Essay makes use of style, voice, and transition words in ways that support the paper and strengthen its argument.
- Quotations: Are chosen and used correctly and responsibly. **No dropped quotes**, no mis-quotes. *They Say, I Say* models for introducing quotes come into play here.
- Grammar and Syntax: No grammatical, syntactical, or punctuation errors.
- MLA formatting: All quotations and citations are in MLA Citation style. Paper is formatted to reflect academic MLA paper formatting
- Great! Congratulations! You reached the end!
- Now, read aloud and annotate.
- Then! Re-type the whole thing for memory on a new blank document. Then, start at Step 1 again. Repeat. Repeat.
